


# What to do with farm wastes

Good waste management practices are essential to ensure a **healthy, safe** and **productive** farm enterprise.

# GOOD WASTE

management practices can:



- Save you money
- Protect your land and waterways from contamination
- Prevent stock injury or death
- Improve the value of your property
- Help you avoid penalties and costly clean-up.

# POOR WASTE

management practices can:



Cause contamination or damage to stock, crops, air, soil and water. This can lead to a decline in farm productivity and threaten the sustainability of your farm, your industry and the surrounding environment.

# KEY THINGS

to consider

- Avoid waste by buying only what you need for the job.
  - Remember that most products and materials can be easily reused, returned or recycled.
  - The disposal of wastes on farms is prohibited, apart from green wastes (i.e. compost and tree branches) and limited numbers of dead stock.
  - No wastes, other than tree branches, should be burnt on a farm. Wastes such as tyres, hay bands, silage wrap and domestic waste must not be burnt.
  - Disposal or recycling of waste that cannot be reused on the farm is available at landfills and transfer stations.

- Prior to disposal, wastes should be stored in a manner that will not lead to the contamination of water or land, or risk the health of humans, stock or crops.
  - Chemical drums should be triple rinsed where the wash-water can be reused for a spray mix and stored in a safe place prior to return for recycling or disposal.
  - The filling of areas on the farm with demolition material is not appropriate and you could face liability for illegal dumping.
